

## INCORE Current Research on Peace and Conflict

INCORE research on conflict and peace issues is interdisciplinary and wide-ranging. This reflects the INCORE ethos - that conflict and peace affect and are affected by a range of global and local phenomena across politics, culture, economics and society.

Much of INCORE's research focuses on societies in transition and most is international and comparative.

Current research themes include:

Major Ongoing Projects include:

- **From Warlords to Peacelords**, a study examining political leadership in conflicted societies. Featuring case studies on Kosovo, Sierra Leone and Afghanistan, From Warlords to Peacelords looks at the issues motivating leaders to make the transition from war to peacebuilding and politics.
- **Reimagining Women's Security in Societies in Transition**. This ESRC-funded project will contribute to an understanding of the role and experiences of women in contemporary post-conflict societies by means of an examination of the gendered meanings of security.
- **History Teaching in Contested Societies**. The UNESCO Centre looks at international approaches to this controversial issue, examining how perceptions are shaped by syllabi and the effect this has on peace and conflict issues.
- **Researching Violent Societies**. This project seeks to bridge the gap in understanding that faces researchers working in conflicted societies, and address the absence of this issue in research methodology literature.
- **Population Change and Inclusion Study Derry/Londonderry**. The aim of the project is to examine the extent to which the Protestant/Unionist community feels included within the cultural, political and social life of the city and its environs.
- **Inclusive Peacebuilding**. This project examines ideas and practices that sustain peace, such as inclusive citizenship, mutual respect, trust, truth, coalitions, justice, forgiveness and reconciliation.
